British Columbia	Eye examinations are covered for individuals aged 18 and younger, or 65 and older under the Medical Services Plan (MSP) if medically required. The criteria for medically required include ocular disease, trauma, or injury; systemic diseases associated with significant ocular risk (e.g. diabetes); medications associated with significant ocular risk. Direct requests to optometrists by a medical practitioner for an eye examination are also a benefit of MSP if there is a medical necessity for the examination. Refractive change with no other pathology does not meet the MSP medically required criteria for payment. The cost of eye examinations for refractive changes is the responsibility of the patient. Eye examinations are payable once every 24, 12, or 6 months depending on the diagnostic code and condition addressed. Adults aged 19 to 64 who receive income and disability assistance, or medical services only, receive an allowance of \$44.83 for an eye examination conducted by an optometrist every 24 months. New eyeglasses are also covered up to the ministry's maximum rate every year for those under 18 years of age, and every 3 years for those over the age of 18. Alberta	Individuals aged 18 and younger, or 65 and older are eligible for one complete eye examination, one partial exam, and one diagnostic procedure per benefit year (July 1 to June 30) under the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan (AHCIP). For individuals aged 19 to 65, the AHCIP provides full coverage for an eye exam that is deemed medically necessary by an optometrist as a result of trauma, a medical condition, or episode of illness. Adults aged 19-64 may be covered for vision services under the Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH) or the Alberta Adult Health Benefit (AAHB) for low-income Albertans. Coverage includes an eye exam and eye glasses for adults every 2 years, and eye glasses every year for dependents up to 18 years old.	Coverage under AHCIP Coverage under AISH Coverage under AAHB		
Saskatchew	Children under the age of 18 are covered for an annual eye exam with Saskatchewan Health coverage. Additional eye exams for children within the same year of an annual eye exam are covered for certain conditions. All individuals who have a confirmed diagnosis of type 1 or 2 diabetes are also covered for an annual eye exam, which includes tonometry, OCT, and photography. Routine follow-up exams are not covered for those with diabetes. Ocular emergencies (e.g. injury to eyes, presence of foreign bodies in the eye) are fully covered, including tonometry. For ocular emergencies, follow-up exams are covered. Visual field testing is covered for SK residents of any age on hydroxychloroquine, in conjunction with a High Risk Medication Consultation. Children under the age of 18, or seniors over the age of 64 covered by Supplementary Health Benefits are eligible for one annual eye exam. Adults aged 18-64 covered by Supplementary Health Benefits are eligible for one eye exam every two years. Manitoba	Eye examinations are covered by Manitoba Health every two years for individuals aged 18 and younger, or 65 and older. Adults aged 19-64 are not covered for eye exams, except when warranted by medical conditions as determined by an eye care provider. Coverage for eye exams includes coverage for full threshold visual field test, tonometry test, and dilated fundus exam. Manitoba Health does not cover prescription glasses or contact lenses. 	Individuals on Employment and Income Assistance (EIA) are covered for an eye exam every two years, eyeglasses every three years, and new lenses if there is a significant change in eyesight. Ontario	Children aged 19 or younger are covered by Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) for one eye exam every 12 months, and any partial assessments needed. Adults aged 20 or older with an eligible medical condition are covered by OHIP for one eye exam every 12 months, and 2 follow-up partial exams. Eligible conditions include but are not limited to: diabetes, glaucoma, ocular drug toxicity, cataracts, and retinal disease. Adults aged 65 and older without an eligible medical condition are covered for one eye exam every 18 months, and 2 follow-up partial exams. 	Individuals receiving income support through Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) who are not otherwise covered by OHIP are covered for a routine eye exam once every two years. For children, assistance with the cost of new lenses may be provided anytime there is a change in prescription.	
Québec	Eye examinations are covered annually for individuals under the age of 18 or age 65 and older under the Régie de l'assurance maladie du Québec (RAMQ). Orthoptic exams for the diagnosis of strabismus among other conditions are covered only for children aged 16 or younger. New Brunswick	Children aged 18 and younger from low-income families are covered for an annual eye exam, lenses, and frames under the Healthy Smiles, Clear Vision Program. Children aged 4 are covered for an eye exam and corrective lenses at different rates depending on their insurance status as a benefit part of the Healthy Smiles, Clear Vision program. 	The Health Services Vision Program is available to individuals on social assistance, or those who have special health needs and who qualify for assisted health care. Adults aged 19 and over are covered for an eye exam once every two years under this program, including comprehensive eye exams, emergency exams, selected frames, and cases. Nova Scotia	Eye examinations are covered by the Government of Nova Scotia through their Optometry Programs once every two years for children under the age of 10, and adults age 65 and older. Recipients of Social Assistance and Assured Income support are covered for one eye exam every 2 years.
